Meetings

Next BUMBA Meeting

Our next meeting will have two topics. **Mellie Landon-Whitlow** will give a presentation on medicinal use of honey. **Brien McNamara** asked if we could have a discussion about note-taking and keeping hive records in the field during a hive inspection. So, we will have several members talk about how they keep notes, what is important, how to they summarize, the little tricks they help them remember what they did and what they need to do. I'm sure we will all learn something from these discussions. It is nice to hear from a member who is suggesting input for a meeting.

The President's Smoker

Well this is certainly a beekeeping spring season for the record book folks. Maybe it will be known as the "Year of No Honeybees" due to the delays of so many of the major package bee suppliers in filling orders for spring packages. The bee losses of the 2012/2013 winter coupled with the cooler spring weather has had an effect on

the entire honeybee industry. The package suppliers say that in order to have a hive strong enough to shake out a package, the hive must have a minimum of 10 full frames of bees or it will not be sustainable. At the end of May, many of those hives dedicated to shaking packages were still only at a level of 7 frames of bees. Many of us have been noting and discussing the "slower" build-up of our hives this year, and apparently this syndrome has been experienced from the hobbyist right on up to the largest of the commercial beekeeping operations. Some locals received earlier packages, some didn't. Some of my hives built up quickly, some didn't. Some beekeepers had dismal losses, some didn't. It is frustrating to have a stand with five seemingly strong hives on it May 1st, and then on June 1st find that, while three are busting at the seams, two are total deadouts...I hope the scientists will find the answer.

Miller Bee Supplies announced that his package shipment will arrive for customer pickup on **June 6**, but I was informed by Mrs. Miller that they will be short of their total with no recourse. They have decided that they will have enough packages to make sure everyone gets some bees by limiting anyone who ordered 2 or more packages to picking up a maximum of 2 packages, and will refund the difference to those who ordered more than 2 packages.

David Polk of **Free State Bees** announced yesterday (June 1) that he will not receive his order until after **June 15**, and still doesn't have an exact date for pickup. He was told that he could expect to receive his order in its entirety, but has posted that if customers want to cancel, within certain restrictions and limitations, he may be able to do that.

Some are concerned about having to supplement feeding all

summer to build a package up for wintering, the monetary costs, and the risk of loss. It's a roll of the dice I suppose, but I believe it can be done, and will share knowledge with the newbees over the support forum, as will many of our experienced beeks. Here's where the rubber meets the road to me...ask yourself, how much do you want to get those bees into a hive? After all, there could be another shortage next spring, more of the same, or some new malady. A smart person might just wait for better times, but I for one, climbed on this train because I wanted to try and help make a difference in the plight of the honeybee. Am I? I don't know, but I am not ready to throw in the towel yet. So, I will take whatever bees get allocated to me and continue to try to figure out how to keep them alive and improving. The reduction of my package allotment definitely effects my nuc production for this year, as I was going to use the package bees as bulk bees to start nucs with and draw frames, queening them with survivor daughters. The established hives are just now strong enough to be making splits, so the nucs available will be slim.

To wrap this column up, I want to say, "Well done", to **Scott Seccomb** and **Toni Burnham** for getting our new support forum up and running (www.bumbabees.com/forums). I think it is a great tool and it is already getting used by many, and will be more invaluable as the packages and nucs trickle in. If you aren't signed up, you should be. This is a private forum for current members of BUMBA, and, please, we need you to use your actual name when signing up, so that we can use it as if we were gathered at a meeting in our discussions. This helps those who are answering questions to better understand the amount of experience the person posting has, and should help us to understand better the level or format of instructions we need to work in. No one should feel intimidated to ask legitimate questions or share experiences etc. We want to have a searchable set of topics and threads that a person can find on their own, or be directed to, that can serve as a perpetually improving reference of our members' experiences. I, for one, have had a good time with it, though I have been an absent for a couple weeks due to work constraints. Come on board and share.

I also wish to commend and once again lavish "**Thank You**" on **Linda Thompson** for the great leadership in heading up the **BUMBA Outreach Program**. Read her report under **Club Happenings**. Reports come in from some out-of-the-way sources, always favorable and appreciative commentary. We still have some of the best events ahead of us, including our club participation in the **Maryland State Fair** event in August. There always is room for more volunteers...those that have participated in our events will tell you what a fun time it is, so come on out. At the meeting on Thursday, we will need to discuss the State Fair event in more detail and try to finalize schedules, and the club display.

I hope to see you all Thursday night. God save the Queen...

MSBA Summer Meeting

June 15, 2013, 9:30AM – 3:30PM

**Plant Sciences Building Auditorium, University of
Maryland/College Park**

The Maryland State Beekeepers Associations will hold their Summer meeting at College Park. Meetings are open to the public for members and non-members, beekeepers and non-beekeepers, alike. This meeting will feature talks on the "perfect hive", hive splitting or swarming to increase survival, pollinator protection, and a Panel and Group Discussion of a proposed MSBA resolution: "Should MSBA Adopt a Position on the Banning or Regulation of Neonictinoids? What strategy is best for the bees?"

Featured speakers for the topics are:

Dr. Gene Kritsky: Professor and Chair of Biology at the College of Mount St. Joseph and author of "The Quest for the Perfect Hive", Adjunct Curator at the Cincinnati Museum Center, and Editor-in-Chief of "*American Entomologist*".

Dr. Galen Dively: Professor Emeritus and Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Consultant at the University of Maryland/College Park.

Michele Colopy: Program Director of the National Pollinator Defense Fund.

Katy Ciola Evan: Graduate student at the University of Delaware Apiculture program studying IPM with a goal of reducing *Varroa* populations

Dr Gene Kritsky received his PhD in Entomology from the University of Illinois in 1977, his Masters in Entomology from the University of Illinois in 1976, and his Bachelors in Biology from Indiana University in 1974.

In his recent book, The Quest for the Perfect Hive, Dr. Kritsky offers a concise, beautifully illustrated history of beekeeping, tracing the evolution of hive design from ancient Egypt to the present.

Dr. Galen Dively, prior to his retirement in 2006 worked in extension and research. He specialized in integrated pest management, non-target risk assessment, and pesticide resistance management. His extension work involved the development and implementation of IPM projects to reduce pesticide use in crops.

Dr. Dively works part-time and is involved with in-state and national training activities to meet the continuing educational needs of agrichemical personnel, crop advisors, county extension educators, and producers. He has been a favorite contributor to past MSBA meetings and it is a pleasure to welcome him again this Spring.

As Program Director of the National Pollinator Defense Fund (NPDF), **Michele Colopy** defends managed and native pollinators vital to a sustainable and affordable food supply from the adverse impacts of pesticides.

They accomplish this mission by ensuring that states and the EPA enforce regulations to protect pollinators from pesticides, and other strategies, including litigation, petitions, and technical support for those who have suffered damages to their beekeeping operations. NPDF provides advocacy, guidance and tools for beekeepers, and

raises awareness about the adverse impacts of pesticides on pollinators.

Michele Colopy has more than 17 years of experience in a variety of nonprofit organizations, including the performing arts, housing and homelessness, foreclosure prevention, community development, and health and wellness areas. Her father raised bees for his small apple orchard in Ohio.

Katy Ciola Evan is a native Floridian with a Bachelor's degree from the University of Florida and several years' experience working as an African Honey Bee lab technician with the FL State Apiary Department. She has just finished her second semester as a Graduate. For her Master's Degree she is developing an 'Integrated Pest Management' (IPM) program for beekeepers in the mid-Atlantic region with the goal of reducing *Varroa* populations.

Roundup of news on chemical controls:

- **Hopguard** has received Section 18 approval for 2013
- **ApiLife VAR** has received Section 3 approval until December 2013 This approval has to be sought each year by the Maryland Department of Agriculture
- **Apivar** has Section 3 approved for use in Maryland as of March 11, 2013.

Reminder: ALWAYS USE CONTROLS AS PER DIRECTIONS OR LABEL! Overuse will not result in better results, and failure to obey application and removal instructions may result in varroa mite resistance.

MDA will participate again in the USDA Honey Bee Pests and Diseases Survey Project for 2014. This national survey will allow us to identify honey bee pests, to inform and guide the direction of honey bee parasite, disease, and pest research, and to help provide mitigation recommendations.

MDA has also approved a job opening for a **Regional Bee Inspector** for Southern Maryland Counties (St. Mary's/Charles/Calvert). Same Scam, Different Country - Chinese Honey Smuggled Into France

Chinese honey smugglers, facing a crackdown in the U.S., are turning their attentions to Europe.

French public service radio station RFI reports honey is shipped from China to Eastern Europe where it is relabeled to say “French origin” and then sent to France.

FPI says a recent study released by the laboratories from the French Centre of Technical Beehiving Studies in Moselle (Cetam) found misleading labels, false country of origin, and additional sugar are plaguing 10% of honey marketed in France.

“The majority of the honey we are worried about is that being sold cheaply and sold in big quantities,” says Cetam director Paul Schweitzer, a pollen specialist. “About 10% of samples sent off for analysis were doubtful.

“These honeys that have undergone adulteration and have a dubious quality are essentially coming from Asia, namely China.”

Preliminary Results: Honey Bee Colony Losses in the United States, Winter 2012-2013

Note: This is a preliminary analysis. A more detailed final report is being prepared for publication at a later date.

The Bee Informed Partnership (<http://beeinformed.org>), in collaboration with the Apiary Inspectors of America (AIA <http://www.apiaryinspectors.org>) and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), is releasing preliminary results for the seventh annual national survey of honey bee colony losses. For the 2012/2013 winter season, a total of 6,287 U.S. beekeepers provided validated responses. Collectively, responding beekeepers managed 599,610 colonies in October 2012, representing about 22.9% of the

country’s estimated 2.62 million colonies.

Preliminary survey results indicate that 31.1% of managed honey bee colonies in the United States were lost during the 2012/2013 winter. This represents an increase in loss of 9.2 points or 42% over the previous 2011/2012 winter’s total losses that were estimated at 21.9% (Figure 1). This level of loss is on par with the 6 year average total loss of 30.5%.

On average, U.S. beekeepers lost 45.1% of the colonies in their operation during the winter of 2012/2013. This is a 19.8 point or 78.2% increase in the average operational loss compared to the previous winter (2011/2012), which was estimated at 25.3%. The difference between average loss and total loss is explained by the respondent pool: while a majority of the respondents (95%) were backyard beekeepers, they managed a small fraction of the colonies represented in the survey (6%). For this reason total loss (which is more heavily influenced by commercial beekeeper losses) is more representative of national losses.

Survey participants indicated that they considered a loss rate of 15% as “acceptable,” but 70% of them suffered losses greater than this.

More Orange Trees for Florida

AUBURNDALE, Fla. (AP) — The Coca-Cola Co. says it is spending \$2 billion to support the planting of 25,000 acres of new orange groves in Florida, a move officials are lauding as a major investment in the Sunshine State’s citrus industry.

The announcement is being made at a late-morning news conference at Coca-Cola’s juice production plant in Auburndale. Details were released in advance to The Associated Press.

Coca-Cola owns the Minute Maid and Simply juice brands.

“It’s an investment in a market that’s very important to us,” said Steve Cahillane, the president of Coca-Cola Americas.

Some 5 million new trees will be planted in the new groves,

believed to be the largest citrus addition in the state for at least 15 years. The groves will be located in Polk, DeSoto and Hendry counties in central Florida.

What Is It About Bees And Hexagons?

Solved! A bee-buzzing, honey-licking 2,000-year-old mystery that begins here, with this beehive. Look at the honeycomb in the photo and ask yourself: (I know you've been wondering this all your life, but have been too shy to ask out loud ...) Why is every cell in this honeycomb a hexagon?

Well, this is a very old question. More than 2,000 years ago, in 36 B.C., a Roman soldier/scholar/writer, proposed an answer, which ever since has been called "The Honeybee Conjecture." Varro thought there might be a deep reason for this bee behavior. Maybe a honeycomb built of hexagons can hold more honey. Maybe hexagons require less building wax. Maybe there's a hidden logic here.

Ultimate Bug Killer, Now With "Free Seeds For Bees"?

"When I wrote a post about 9 things businesses can do to help save bees, one of the suggestions was to give out free wildflower seeds.

Another suggestion, however, was to stop killing bees.

If this photo (above right) is real and not a slightly early April Fools joke, then it seems Bayer CropScience may not just be promoting its free bee-friendly seeds online anymore, but also on the packaging of a product that has been implicated in the deaths of honeybees.

First posted on British Bees' Facebook page last Saturday, commenters have since verified they've seen similar looking packaging in stores across the UK, including Waitrose and Asda.

You see the beautifully named Provado Ultimate Bug Killer contains thiacloprid, a neonicotinoid pesticide which may increase bees' vulnerability to death from nosema, a deadly parasite that is on the increase in honeybee populations. (Nonlethal exposure to imidacloprid, another neonicotinoid produced by Bayer, has also been shown in tests to increase the risk of bee deaths from *Nosema*.)”
